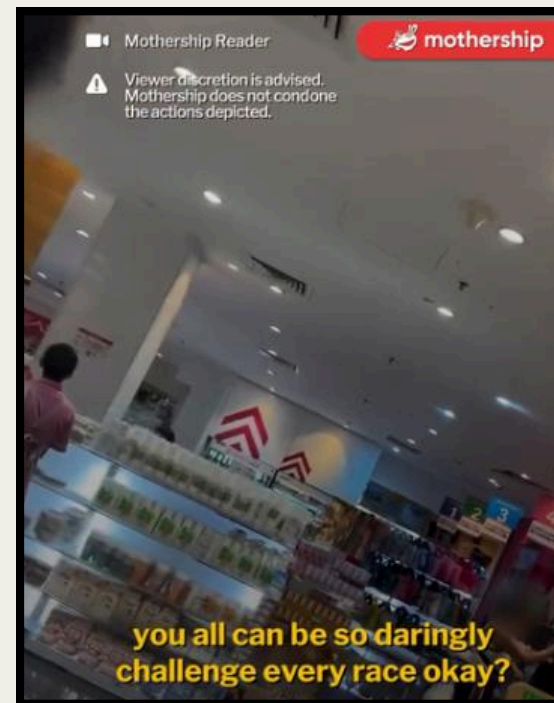

“Casual racism” and Microaggression as silent creepers

- **WHAT IS IT?** Speech and behaviour that convey negative stereotypes and prejudices about other races.
- **WHY DOES IT MATTER?** It may be intentional or unintentional, and sometimes even well-meaning, but they communicate hostile, derogatory or negative racial messages or assumptions to the receiver.
- **HOW CAN WE RESPOND?** Be more mindful and sensitive as to how our words and actions may affect others.

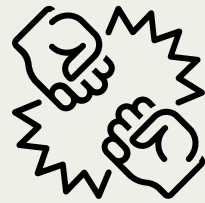


Changing demographics

- **WHAT IS IT?** Increasing diversity in our population, e.g., low birth rates and an increase in non-resident population.
- **WHY DOES IT MATTER?** Differences within a non-homogenous society with diverse beliefs and cultural practices may be accentuated.
- **HOW CAN WE RESPOND?** Find ways to expand our shared common ground, e.g., better appreciate different cultural and religious practices, or help to integrate new citizens and permanent residents.

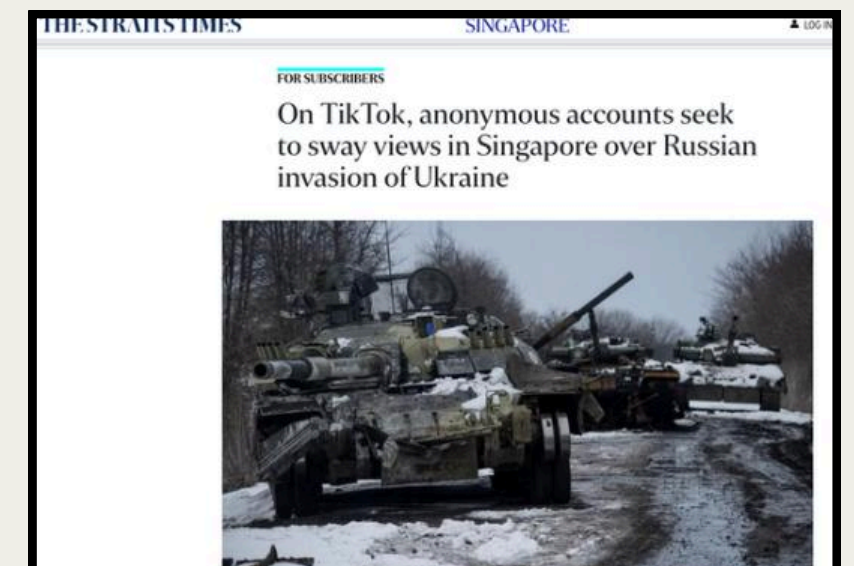
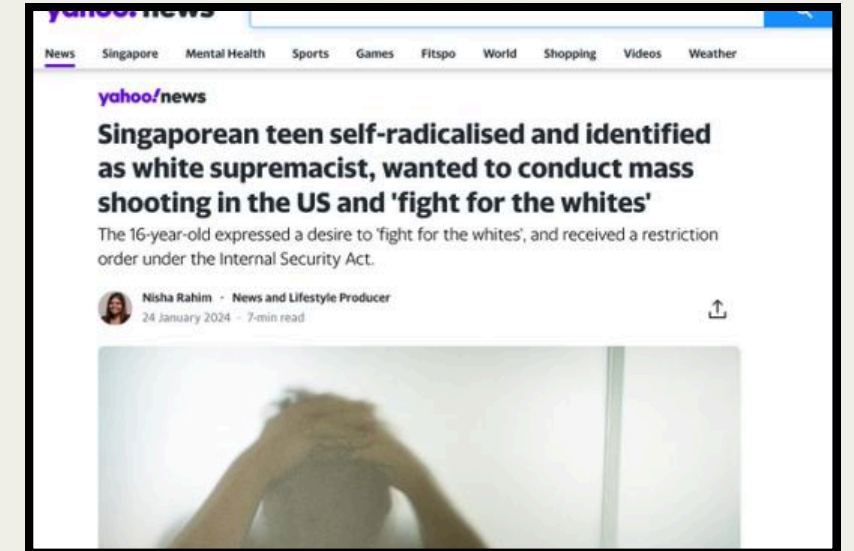

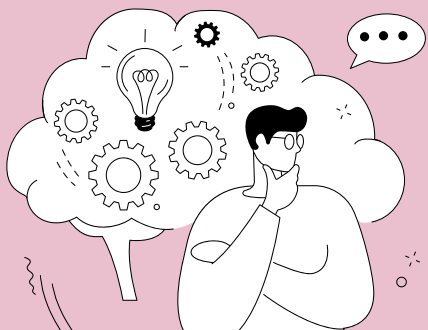
We are not spared from the spillover impact of international conflicts

- **WHAT IS IT?** As a small country, we cannot escape powerful cross-currents, such as right-wing nationalism, anti-immigration and anti-globalisation.
- **WHY DOES IT MATTER?** Mutual trust and respect among different races and religions in Singapore are hard-earned; such external events may impinge on our social cohesion and harmony.
- **HOW CAN WE RESPOND?** We must collectively strengthen the peace and social cohesion that is essential to the Singaporean way of life:
 - Be mindful of online attempts to turn external events into emotionally charged issues and sow discord in our society.
 - Be respectful and constructive in dialogue and discourse, both online and offline.
 - Use social media responsibly, such as verifying information before reacting to or sharing content.

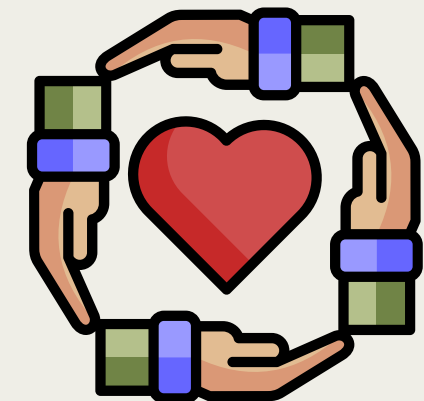

More than half of Singaporeans view their nation’s diversity as good for the country.

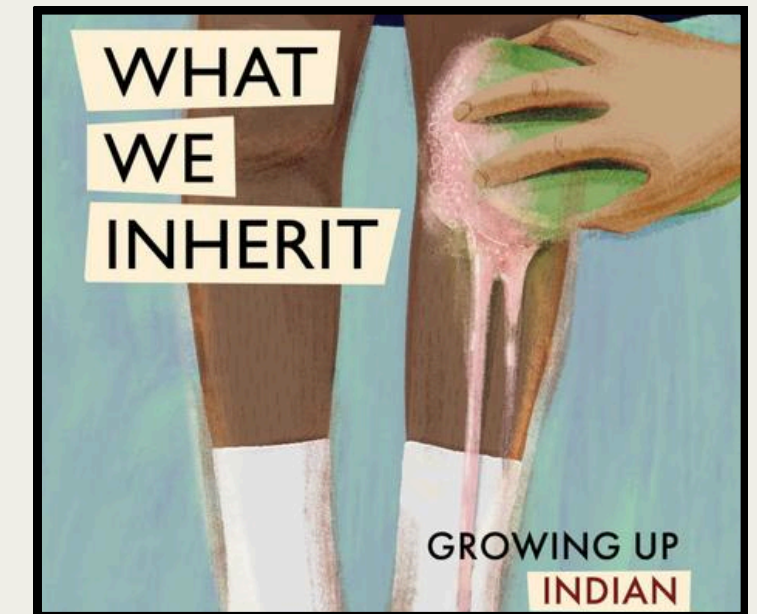
Society / Community Initiatives

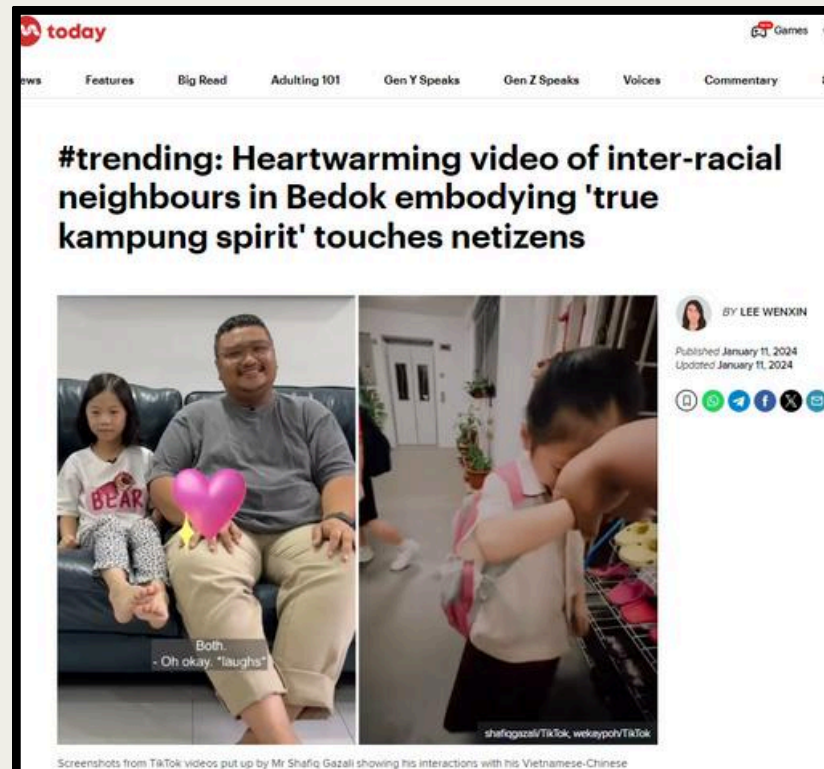
Individual Initiatives

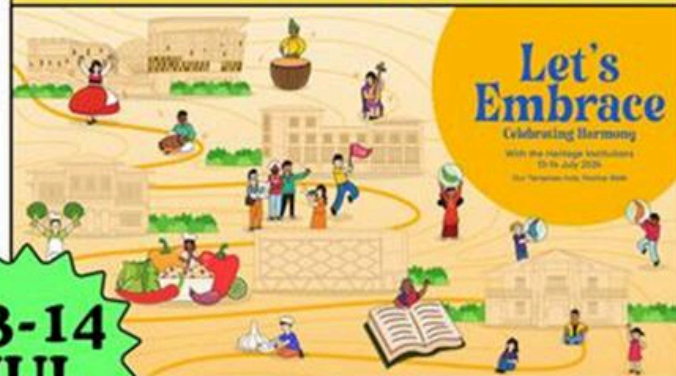

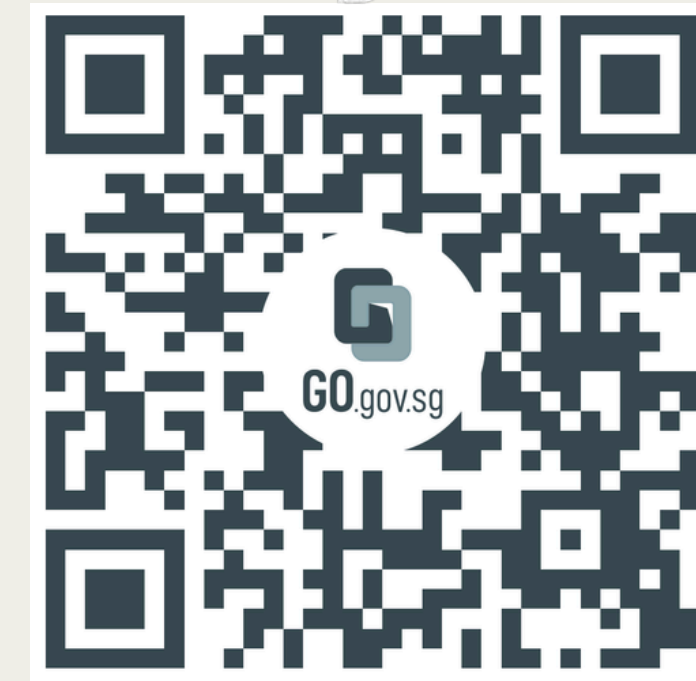
